

Lake Representatives


Volunteers who represent their lake association, neighborhood or business

Survey method

Awareness

- Newsletter insert
 - 1,800 copies mailed
 - Lake and river HHs + elected officials
- Online version
- Press coverage

Response

- 208 respondents
 - 80% lake property owners
 - About half completed the survey online

On the environment

- Why is DRED not doing anything about protecting Long Sands? It's a disgrace.
- We have enjoyed Ossipee Lake for over 60 years and have witnessed the decline in the water quality which started around 1970. Hope we can take measures to reverse this trend for future generations.
- Quicker action and harsher penalties for those who choose to ignore environmental and zoning laws.



On boating

- Too many power boats for the size of the lake. It seems every
 property has a boat these days. I remember when there were no
 boats or docks on the spindle. Now I see houses with multiple boats.
- The lake is at risk of becoming a free zone for unsocial, offensive and dangerous behavior.
- Limit the size of boats on lake.
- Address the problems of jet skis on lake noise, dangerous operation, pollution.



On government

- A long-term vision is required to ensure that growth is managed before we lose special habitat and the rural character that adds to our quality of the lake.
- Towns must stop granting exceptions to the zoning laws.
- Keeping milfoil and pollution in check benefits everyone but it seems visitors get to take their enjoyment from the lake without the same stewardship burden imposed on property owners.
- I am not a year-round resident, but as a waterfront owner I am so frustrated by "taxation without representation"!



On associations

- I feel that knowing your neighbors keeps the lake area safer and provides avenues for helping others.
- I would like to see more participation in the homeowner associations and more communication between the various associations.
- I am interested in meeting times and locations. I would like to attend forums whenever possible.
